COURSE DEVELOPMENT

UNHS Curriculum

UNHS online high school courses are carefully developed to **create a high-quality, rigorous education**. Courses meet the **national academic content standards and Nebraska state academic standards** for all core subject matter areas—English, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies.

Courses are evaluated annually and updated on a regular basis to reflect changes in learning outcomes, standards and world views. New courses are added constantly to provide students with relevant learning experiences.

UNHS' core and AP courses are approved by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). The National Collegiate Athletic Association is a member-led organization dedicated to the well-being and lifelong success of college athletes. This is of great advantage for College-bound student-athletes preparing to enroll in a Division I or Division II school, as they will meet the required academic standards and will be prepared for college coursework.

UNHS also meets the iNACOL National Standards of Quality for Online Courses.

iNACOL is a nonprofit organization which focuses on improving secondary education through competency-based, blended, and online learning.

UNHS Subjects

UNHS high school courses are developed by a team of subject matter experts:

- University professors with extensive knowledge and credentials in the content area.
- Instructional designers with teaching backgrounds who are experienced in distance education course development and pedagogy.

How Courses Work

WayCool: UNHS Course Management System

Through UNHS' course management system, WayCool, students access their online course content, coursework, grades and instructor feedback.

Accessing Courses

Following enrollment, students receive an e-mail with their username and password for WayCool.

Sequencing & Gating

Sequencing means all teacher connect activities, unit evaluations, projects and progress tests within a course must be completed by the student in the order they are presented. Gating means only one assignment per course can be submitted each day.

Submitting Assignments

Courses include graded and non-graded assignments. Students must submit all graded assignments, and should complete all non-graded assignments to effectively learn the content and prepare for graded evaluations and progress tests.

All assignments are submitted through WayCool, although some larger files may require the use of the UNHS DropBox. A few assignments, such as art projects, may need to be mailed to UNHS.

All progress tests, whether submitted online or by mail, are administered by an approved proctor.

ACCREDITATION

The University of Nebraska High School is accredited by the Nebraska Department of Education and AdvancED, which brings together more than 100 years of experience and the expertise of the three largest U.S.-based accreditation agencies:

- North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement (NCA CASI.)
- Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement (SACS CASI).
- Northwest Accreditation Commission (NWAC).

Due to this accreditation, the University of Nebraska High School is a diploma awarding high school. Students may enroll in UNHS and, upon completion of graduation requirements, earn a high school diploma that is recognized, **respected and accepted by colleges and universities worldwide.**

New Courses

Course Content (Syllabus)

- The course content (syllabus) contains instructional material that leads a student, in a step-by-step progression, through the course.
- **Course introductions** help students relate to the topics that will be covered. They also contain the course objectives, materials required for the course, information about how the course is organized and a student record to help students keep track of their progress. Also included are course weights, which are used to determine the final course grade.
- **Units and lessons** present students with content delivered in a student-friendly manner. Learning objectives are stated and textbook reading assignments are given. Graphics and interactive activities help keep students' attention, encourage them to relate the information to their own experiences and explain difficult concepts.
- Non-graded assessments, called "self-checks," non-graded activities that are presented
 in every lesson to help students gauge their understanding and to help them prepare for
 the graded assessments.
- **Required assignments**, called "teacher connect activities," provide additional ways for students to interact with the teacher, prepare for projects and tests, review concepts and look deeper into topics that interest them. They must be submitted in the sequence given in the Student Record and My Work section to satisfy the requirement.

Graded Assessments

These include:

- **Open-book evaluations**, which feature objective style questions that are instantly graded through the UNHS online learning platform.
- **Teacher-graded projects** that usually contain some type of writing exercise such as a report, poster, laboratory experiment, etc. Projects are graded by UNHS teachers, and grades are posted in the online learning platform within five business days from receipt.
- **Progress tests**, which are closed-book tests that must be supervised by a proctor. The student's proctor has access to the testing materials and will inform the student of the test-taking directions.

Delivery

The course content (syllabus) is generally available both online and in print. Online courses are delivered through the UNHS online learning platform. For courses that are available only in print, the printed course content is a required purchase.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

To earn a UNHS diploma, students must earn a minimum of 200 credit hours (20 units). Graduation requirements are based on state accreditation requirements. Two diploma tracks are offered — college-prep and general studies (page 2).
